.... there was a **BIG** party in Whittier. It was the fiftieth wedding anniversary of Jonathan and Rebecca Bailey, so that would be in 1892. Friends, relatives and neighbors came from near and as far as Wilmington, Ohio. The happiest part of the day for Uncle Jonathan was before the formal program began. Twenty! dollars worth of confections had been purchased and seperated into 300 packages, which were distributed to the school children who had been brought to wish the couple well. His love for children and kindness toward them made this a very special event.

Dr. Elias Jessup and Rev. Thomas Armstrong had charge of the outdoor ceremonies. During the program, Rebecca and Jonathan repeated the vows to each other as they had 50 years before using the antiquated ceremony that few in their audience would ever see again. When the original marriage certificate was shown, it was noted that three of the witnesses on it were still living; Eliza Haworth, Josiah Bailey and James Frazier.

The houses of James and Edward Bailey were opened, also, for the convenience of the guests and the meal was served to 50 guests at a time at the home of Edward. Numerous suitable gifts, some quite valuable, were presented to this celebrated couple throughout the day.

NEIGHBORLY VISIT UP RIVER

..... in the 3100 block of Tyler in El Monte at the corner of Mildred Street sits the El Monte Museum manned by the historical people and curated by Lillian Wiggins. It is open Tuesday through Friday from 10-4 with group tours by appointment week ends and evenings. Those who visited there on the bus tour with the mini-conference will not have to be encouraged to return. One glance is enough to convince you that a long browse is warranted.

Most of our local communities along the San Gabriel River look back at the Monte as the jumping-off place. So many of the founders of the various communities went first to El Monte and then on to the land they were settling. The museum has preserved many of the pictures and memorabelia that tell the story of this base of immigrant fan. And, speaking of stories, the one about creation of this museum is in itself a page worthy of any history book. Ask them about it.

Hop in your pony cart and head west on the Pomona Freeway and north on Santa Anita, which becomes Tyler, then almost to the San Bernadino Freeway or use the old back roads you remember to get there. Step up to the desk and announce proudly, "I'm from the Whittier Historical Society", then be prepared to enjoy yourself for an hour or two.
